HUGE IMPROVEMENT FROM LAST 2 SEMESTERS AS MEMBERSHIP GPA IS 2.86, SCHOLASTIC POLICY TO HELP RAISE GPA FURTHER.

Grades are the most important aspect of the college and fraternity experience. We have had our struggles over the past couple of semesters, but are taking great measures to improve them. Last semester, the brothers of the Beta Kappa Chapter have taken great strides in improving the membership GPA, as we have achieved a 2.8597 house GPA, with a 2.992 members' GPA, and 14th overall. The all-men's campus average was 2.65, and we surpassed it by 0.2 grade points, which currently puts us at Maxwell status for Scholastics. We are still striving to raise our GPA to a 3.0 or better, and we are implementing a scholastics policy that will be enforced. In an effort to improve the grades of the pledge classes as well as the entire house, responsibility to the brotherhood will be the key in our new Scholastics Policy. Every brother and associate member will be expected to hand in a test report after they receive their scores for each exam they take. This report will take five seconds, only requiring them to write their name, the class, and the score they got. By doing this we will have an idea of how to assess everyone's progress. With these test scores the Scholastics committee will be able to see who is struggling in classes and will be able to help give them the resources they need to succeed, whether it is school-offered tutoring, help from a brother who has taken the class, or just study advice. Reorganizing the Test Files is the other piece to the new policy. By having strong test files and notes it will make it much easier for brothers to study for tests and complete homework assignments. In an effort to improve grades next fall there will also be a system in place to help brothers get in the same classes as each other. Being responsible for helping each other in these classes will also raise self awareness to not want to let each other and the house down.

RUSH PLANS FOR THIS SPRING & FALL, GOAL TO IMPROVE NUMBERS & TO REPEAT RESULT FROM LAST SUMMER.

Recruitment has continued to progressively improve in terms of efficiency and the number of associates for the past several summers. This continual improvement has occurred because of a commitment to excellence made by the undergraduates and vital support from Beta Kappa alumni. For summer 2010, the undergraduates would like to continue the recent tradition of improvement while building upon the success of previous summers. Once again alumni support will be a crucial aspect for this growth. The recruitment team is already hard at work planning Greek Discovery Day, which is March 27. Focus for summer recruitment will be placed on individual connections instead of mere dollars spent. In the summer of 2009 important suggestions for potential associate members in their areas of residence were given to the recruitment team by alumni and resulted in multiple signings of young men that are now brothers. We are also planning on signing at least a 5-man pledge class for Spring 2010 which will make summer rush that much easier. If this system of recommendation continues the undergraduates are confident in yet another successful summer. This is where the leadership and the maturity of the M.O.O. and Assistant M.O.O. will come into play, as they want to provide an overall fun experience, while at the same time teaching them the skills needed to succeed not only as a member of Phi Kappa Tau, but to succeed as a college student here at Oklahoma State and to succeed as a professional human being.

ABSOLUT PLEDGE CLASS AND HOMECOMING LAST SEMESTER HELP PHILANTHROPY BECOME STRONG POINT FOR CHAPTER.

Last spring, we were developing a big event that we can organize, promote, and implement in order to help out with Hole in the Wall donations. That event was Absolut Pledge Class, our well-known philanthropy event that has been absent since 2006. We had 8 houses participate in Absolut Pledge Class, and throughout the 3-day event the chapter raised \$1,844. In addition, Absolut Pledge Class created such a buzz around campus that more houses will be willing to participate in it next year, which will help us raise even more money for Hole in the Wall. We also raised \$654 during Homecoming, selling turkey legs and having a Jupiter Jump on display for little kids. Minus the \$75 reward for the first place winner in Absolut Pledge Class and \$40 for expenses, we raised a grand total of \$2,403 during the Fall 2009 semester, which should qualify us to earn a national award for Beta Kappa. Adding this with all the money we donated to other philanthropies in the community and on campus puts us in Maxwell status for this year.

This semester, our philanthropy chairman, Zane Riggs, plans to create a philanthropy event that involves a sorority, one idea being a dance-off style competition along with many other small fun activities to supplement it. He also plans to have a philanthropy mixer with all the houses in order for all the philanthropy chairs to network together and to inform each other what and when their philanthropy events are, so we can participate in their events and they can participated in ours. He will be working towards a semester that will be as successful as last semester.

COMMUNITY SERVICE LOOKS TO ACHIEVE CONSECUTIVE MAXWELL RESULT.

Charitable service is an important and easy way for fraternities to interact positively with their respective communities. Last year, the Beta Kappa Chapter had more than enough hours of community service to qualify for Maxwell status in that category, one that won us 2 national awards for total community service hours and average community service hours per member with 2,833 and 51.5, respectively, and this is an achievement that can be repeated. So far this year the chapter has participated in the fall semester's large-scale community service event, Into the Streets. Along with campus-wide events, individual brothers and associate members have done community service with organizations within Stillwater, such as The Humane Society, Habitat for Humanity, and the Salvation Army. The Beta Kappa Chapter will continue to provide service to Stillwater and its surrounding communities in 2010.

MANY IMPROVEMENTS TO THE HOUSE MADE DURING 2009 AND WORK WEEK JANUARY 2010.

With a 50+ year old house there are always things that need repaired and updated.
